Village Scenarios: What Would You Do?

How to Play

1. Tell students: "In a strong village, everyone plays a part in keeping each other safe."
2. Read a short scenario aloud
3. Students turn and talk with a partner:
 - What's the safe choice?
 - Who is part of your village that could help?
4. After each one, invite a few students to share responses and reinforce the key message: Speak up. Look out for others. Use your safe circle.

Scenarios:

1. Someone in a group chat asks for your password "as a joke."
2. A student is being left out at recess.
3. A person you don't know sends you a message in a game.
4. You hear a rumor being spread about a classmate.
